

WHO WE ARE


Helvetas, an international network of independent affiliate member organisations, is working in the fields of development cooperation and emergency response. We promote the fundamental rights of individuals and groups and strengthen governments and other duty bearers in their service provision, building upon six decades of development experience. With 1450 collaborators in about 30 countries, of whom 1220 are national staff, the network members share a common vision and mission and subscribe to common working principles and policies. We jointly implement development programmes and adhere to a common strategy,

working approaches and thematic areas of intervention. In Switzerland, Helvetas is structured as an association of 100,000 members and donors and has offices in Zürich, Bern, Geneva and Balerna.








Programme expenditure by continent




Access to clean water and sanitary facilities is a prerequisite for a healthy life and regional development. Meeting this basic need reduces infant mortality, relieves women from the burden of carrying water long distances, and increases productivity. Constructing water supply systems

and latrines, hygiene training, and advocating for a fair water policy are important activities for Helvetas. We also promote building roads and trail bridges to shorten the journey to schools, health centres and markets. "Our soil is turning salty. And we know that the water from the local spring pool isn't safe anymore. Now we get clean water from our rainwater cisterns – even in the dry season."

Over 800 million people around the world go hungry every day. Helvetas helps small farmers improve their crop yields while respecting the environment through efficient irrigation, ecological farming methods and crop diversification. We help farming families gain a place in local

and regional markets as well as access to international fair trade. Training courses and micro-loans open up new production opportunities for rural communities. In this way, farmers and small businesses can become drivers of rural development. "It was tough at the beginning, and we lost heart more than once. But each time I said, 'keep going'. We used to have nothing and I didn't know how I would pay for my children's education. Now I know."

Global climate change threatens the livelihood of farming families in vulnerable regions. Helvetas teaches them how to protect land and crops from environmental risks and adapt their farming methods. Farmers learn how to conserve the soil,

forest and watersheds. We also call for industrial nations and newly industrialized countries to cut greenhouse gas emissions. We maintain a critical eye on Swiss climate policy, and our experts engage actively in global climate debates.

"If we are to take on new challenges then we'll need a lot more research. And we'll need plenty of farmers to try what we learned. For people to understand the point of new farming methods, they have to see it with their own eyes. So that's why I show them how it's done."
